Its programme, campaigns, events and publications aim to connect writers and readers wherever they are in the world. Free the Word! is PEN International's flagship series of events on contemporary global literature. The Free the Word! team works with PEN Centres and partner festivals to develop an international network of literary activity. Free the Word! aims to bring writers together across cultures to share experiences and explore and open conversations about how literature can transform, influence and excite. Each event series is rooted in its local culture, but is international in outlook.

PEN LEBANON

In a region laden with the ramifications of a post-authoritarian Arab order, there is dire need in Lebanon to build common grounds for all writers beyond sectarian affiliations and calculations. PEN Lebanon could provide this common space, thus freeing literature from the state's and political elite's grip, and enabling writers to regain their legitimate role at the forefront of national debate. An independent institution like PEN Lebanon, linked to an internationally recognized body, can help protect writers from all forms of censorship, whether those originating from state or religious authorities. PEN Lebanon wishes also to serve two equally important roles: help Lebanese writers play their part in the building of a postwar trans-sectarian civic culture; and help reestablish Lebanon as a bridge between different but overlapping cultures and as the crossroad of Arab cultural life.


Want to create a really strong password? Ask Hamlet.
