AREQUIPA 2022

The eighth edition of Hay Festival Arequipa marked an exciting return to in-person events, with audiences and participants enjoying a four-day festival, plus a full day of activities in the city of Moquegua. The big issues of the moment, the best literature and activities such as the Stand up Ilustrado by Liniers and Montt or the play La poeta, completed a programme of 98 activities, in which 128 personalities from culture, science and journalism debated, talked and shared their knowledge and experiences in front of a lively and moved audience.

We had 25,000 attendees in person and 63,870 digital views. We registered 1,429,633 users on our social media, who experienced coverage of the festival mainly from Peru, Mexico, Colombia, and also from Paraguay, Argentina, Spain, the United States, Chile, Bolivia and Uruguay. In addition, to extend our coverage, the activities we broadcasted via streaming were available to the public on the Hay Festival website (www.hayfestival.org/arequipa) and on our Facebook page until the 21st of November.

After two years of digital editions, conversation, critical thinking and the celebration of the best of international culture were the stars of a very special festival, filling the cities of Arequipa and Moquegua with personalities and audiences eager to celebrate this festival of ideas. The festival offered a wide variety

of themes for all audiences, bringing knowledge to all kinds of people through words, analysing the challenges and problems of the present day with an optimistic and positive outlook in order to imagine

The festival began with the Hay Forum Moquegua, the 2nd of November with 8 activities. On the 3rd and until the 6th of November, the Hay Festival Areguipa 2022 programme continued. We opened with a workshop on journalism and travel writing, led by the journalists Federico Bianchini and Ernesto Picco, in which 15 scholarship-winning journalists from Peru and other countries in the region took part. We also continued our activities in the women's and men's penal institutions of Socabaya, Arequipa, belonging to the INPE, with Gustavo Rodríguez, María Teresa Ruiz Rosas and Olga Montero Rose, accompanied by Estefanía Bengoa.

Literature We were accompanied by Peruvian authors, including names such as Daniel Alarcón, Rafael Dumett, Gabriela Wiener, Jeremías Gamboa, Kathy Serrano, Gustavo Rodriguez, Carlos Herrera, Teresa Ruiz Rosas, Katya Adaui and Fernando Ampuero. And international writers such as Nuria Barrios, Gonzalo Celorio, Gioconda Belli, Piedad Bonnett, Ignacio Martínez de Pisón, Gabriela Cabezón Cámara, Vanessa Londoño, Claudia Piñeiro, Nikita Lalwani and Rosemary Sullivan.

Talks on <u>indigenous languages and identity</u>, which are becoming increasingly relevant, were addressed by Carmen Pachas Piélago, Cynthia Rodríguez, Velia Vidal and Roberto Zariquiey.

Film and Visual Arts were present with Alex von Tunzelmann, Heiner Valdivia, Miguel Barreda and Julien Petit with Nereida Apaza and José Luis Delgado, in their respective sessions.

Acclaimed Icelandic writer **Andri Snaer Magnason** and **Joseph Zárate** discussed the <u>climate emergency</u>.


